Dear NJUHSD Families,

Our staff cares about the mental health of our students. If you think your child may need additional mental health support, we want to help you get started. This letter contains information about how to access mental health services on our campuses and in our community.

The STARS Student Assistance Program provides mental health screenings and interventions to support students who are experiencing obstacles to being successful in school. STARS therapists provide resources and referrals, as well as direct short-term interventions such as individual or group therapy. Many families use their medical insurance to pay for mental health services. You can contact your insurance company to request a list of providers who specialize in work with teens. Some insurance plans, like Medi-Cal, cover the cost of therapy completely. Ask your insurance company whether your plan includes a deductible or co-pay fee. Therapy may be more affordable than you think.

Additionally, Nevada Joint Union High School District approved a contract with Care Solace to provide care coordination services for school/district to promote community access to mental health care and support student wellbeing and learning. Care Solace is designed to work alongside the school's multi-tiered systems of support (MTSS) and to help schools triage and support student mental health needs and provide a confidential wraparound resource for staff members and families. Care Solace provides live multilingual, 24/7/365 assistance in finding quality local mental therapists and substance use programs and counseling services. If you or a family member are looking for help with mental health or substance use, Care Solace will quickly connect you to community providers matched to your needs. **Call 888-515-0595** at any time or search on your own at www.caresolace.com/njuhsd.

Another good way to get help is to talk to your child's doctor. Your pediatrician can help identify any underlying medical issues and refer you to counseling support (they often have recommendations). Some clinics even offer counseling onsite. These include:

Finally, if your child is in crisis, Nevada County Behavioral Health provides a free **24-hour crisis line at 530-265-5811**. Crisis counselors can help in an emergency (for example, if your teen is suicidal), and they will help you find ongoing support after the crisis has passed.
